



Henry "Hank" Eugene Henricks

September 29, 1942 - September 17, 2020

Hank was born September 29, 1942, in Louisville, Kentucky to Edward Marshall and Dorothy Collins Henricks. He passed away peacefully on September 17, 2020, at the age of 77, in Tallahassee, Florida, where he had made his home since 1976.

Hank graduated from Male High School, Louisville, Kentucky in 1960, then attended the University of Louisville until enlisting in the military in 1964. The son of a decorated Marine, he proudly served his country in the United States Army as a medical laboratory technician until his honorable discharge in 1967.

Hank enjoyed a long, impactful career with Florida State University where he oversaw the Bioanalytical Synthesis Services (BASS) Laboratory within the Department of Chemistry. For twenty-eight years he coordinated the processing and synthesizing of DNA and peptides for numerous researchers at FSU and other universities across the country.

Outside of his children and grandchildren, his next greatest passion was, without a doubt, bass fishing. He had skills and knowledge of the sport like no other, and he delighted in teaching others. When he was no longer able to get out on the water, he enjoyed reading, genealogy, studying military history and helping others whenever the opportunity presented. One of his most cherished pastimes was connecting with and visiting retired Marines who had

served alongside his father at the Battle of Iwo Jima.

Hank had a strong faith in the Lord and looked forward to being reunited with his parents and his only brother, Edward Henricks, all of whom predeceased him. He is survived by his children, son, Brendan Shane Henricks (Angie) and daughter, Shana Henricks Lasseter (Lee); grandsons Spencer Shane Henricks, Jared Kenneth Henricks and Marshall Carlisle Lasseter; Goddaughters, Lilly Hurt Lewis and Samantha Hurt Buckley, and numerous, very special lifelong friends.

The family wishes to extend their heartfelt gratitude to Ms. Tamesha Graham, owner, Love and Care Senior Companion Services, and each of her team members who so lovingly cared for Hank in his home over the last few years.

A memorial service celebrating Hank's life will be at 11:00AM on Friday, September 25, 2020 at Pisgah United Methodist Church. The inurnment with military honors will follow at 1:00PM at Tallahassee National Cemetery. “Hank, we made it! Thirteen and half hours, eleven thousands mile each way in one and half days. Such was the kind of energy you gave us, though you are with us no longer. The two moving, memorable ceremonies touched our hearts and left profound marks on us for the rest of our lives.

For many of friends and family, Hank loved fishing; I love fish too, in a different way. So we did not talk about fish that much. Hank was a man of God; I have another of a sort. So we did not talk about Him that much. Hank was proud of his service in the army; I have never been to the army (still have never even touched a gun). Naturally, we did not have much to share about military matters. Hank and I couldn't be more different physically as well: he is big and tall and I am short and small. However, none of these hindered our friendship one bit: Hank was the best friend I have ever had.

Hank has been especially well known for one of his passions: bass fishing. It was stated in his eulogy that “he had the skill and knowledge of the sport no one has.” And when it comes to other skills, Hank's talent in negotiation was as equally unmatched--if not more so--than that of the fishing. He was the greatest negotiator I have ever known. He was amazing regardless of the matter of negotiation: expensive science equipment, houses, cars, loans, and appliances, anything you need. He knew exactly what to hold and when to fold. He was extremely knowledgeable and treated everyone with thoughtful consideration and deep respect. Everyone on both sides always ended up happy at the end of each deal. Hank was a great strategist and skillful tactician when it came to making a deal. In his own words, he approached every negotiation with “sharpened pencils”, stayed as calm as “the middle of the eye of a hurricane”, and conduction of the whole deal was “as smooth as a baby's butt”.

“Hank's Dogma” of negotiation, seemed easy but was hard to follow. It is based on detailed and insightful knowledge of what to deal with, the understanding and thoughtful consideration of whom to deal

with, and the utmost unselfish placement of the heart. The “Art of the Deal” I learned from Hank is far superior to the method the author of “You Know Who” described. Hank was amazing at getting good deals for everyone, as well as both sides. If Hank were given the power to “make deals” in the world stage, there would be less conflicts, if not everlasting peace on earth.

On the way back driving through the long night, I kept thinking what Pastor West asked at end of the memorial service in the Pisgah United Methodist Church in Tallahassee: “What would you want to be remembered as? What would you do if you only have twenty four hours to live?” I have not yet thought of the answer to the first question, but I remembered I had asked Hank the second question one day in his office during our often-shared lunch hour. His answer was: “I cannot think of doing anything different. I just continue do what I am doing every day.” From that day on, I have been trying to live the same way Hank did.

Hank was one of the ordinary men walked on this earth, yet he has left extraordinary prints along the way, for his friends and family to remember, cherish and follow. He lived a four “-ful” life of “helpful, cheerful, grateful and peaceful”. His legacy was not money or fame, but a true gentleman and a noble person whom every man should try emulate.

Driving on the Sixth Street at 7:15 at dusk in the city of Lawrence, the huge setting sun occupied the center of the entire end of the street, a rare event that only happed a few times in a year. For me, it looked like the smiling face of Hank, looking back from the edge of this world. Hank, one day we will sit down, sharpen our pencils and get another “deal” together.
